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When he first began, the best thing about my dad working as an **astronaut**<sup>1</sup> for NASA seemed to be that he would leave me alone. He would just smile knowingly, **smirk**<sup>3</sup> at my mom, and ask if I had finished my physics homework yet.

The truth of it was that I was kind of jealous of him. How many people get to go up to space and see Earth from such an incredible perspective? Can you even imagine being thrust up into the atmosphere in a metal box? Being so far away from your own planet, but also so close to it that you feel like you could hold it in your hand?

But my dad made things difficult, and by the time the day of his launch came, I was more than ready to see him go.

“Be good, Jason,” he said, giving me a one-armed hug in a room off the launch site.

“You too,” I mumbled.

“Take care of your mom and brother.”

I nodded, and he moved on to kiss Timothy’s forehead.

We had said our actual goodbyes the night before, at a big party that my mom had thrown for him with all his family and friends. She’d made burgers on the grill, and barbecued some steaks—food my dad definitely was not going to be eating for the next few weeks. After everyone had left and the barbeque was cleaned, he gave me a letter in an envelope, telling me not to open it until after I got home from the launch.

My mom was crying, and my dad pressed her shoulder. “I’ll get in touch as soon as I can,” he said.
